

Achieving Better Control in a Multi-Cloud Estate





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Preface

Throughout the year, the VMware Research and Insights organization partners with independent, third-party research institutions to interview thousands of IT executives, practitioners and developers on the most urgent technology issues facing enterprises today. From March to June 2022, VMware interviewed more than 2,100 technology execs and decision makers regarding key topics, including the effect of multi-cloud adoption on their business. This brief explores those findings in more detail.

Introduction

As we enter the second half of 2022, technology leaders are continuing to disperse their infrastructure across multiple clouds for a plethora of reasons, while more than half now say they are operating more modern apps than traditional apps. Individual lines of business have a hand in driving this change, with cloud configurations varying from team to team within some organizations. As a result, security has become a key goal as tech execs seek to gain visibility and control over their multi-cloud estate. We surveyed more than 2,100 global technology leaders to determine what their organizations are prioritizing, and these are some key findings.

Part 1: Distributed infrastructure continues to gain traction

While only a few short years ago many companies were just starting to branch into one public cloud, using multiple public clouds has overwhelmingly become the norm. Eighty-seven percent of IT leaders now report¹ they are using at least two public clouds, climbing 13 percent year over year.²

Likewise, organizations continued to diversify their application deployments across environments. In 2021, 75 percent of respondents deployed applications on private cloud, public cloud, edge and colocation deployments,³ and in 2022 that number rose to 80 percent.⁴ Moreover, developer teams report that modern apps built to run on any cloud overtook traditional apps in 2022, rising 6 percent year over year to 51 percent.

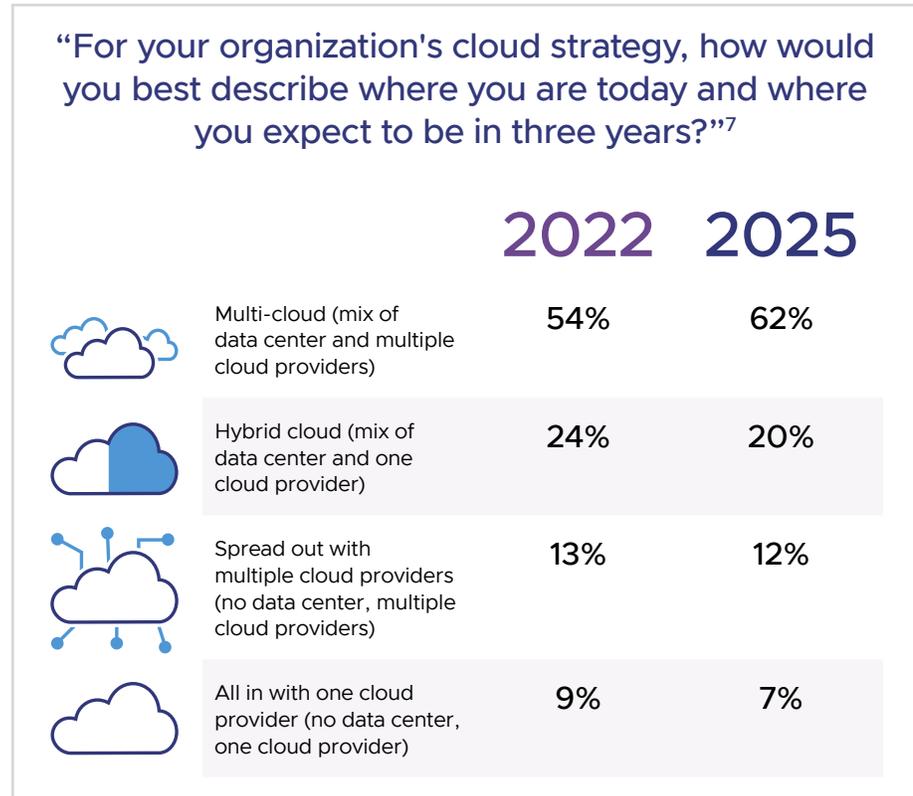

Part 2: Flexibility drives multi-cloud adoption

Tech execs shared a number of reasons for adopting multiple clouds, but two points stood out. First, organizations are still feeling a great deal of uncertainty about the state of the market, and second, different teams and lines of business are facing unique needs. The flexibility of using multiple providers allows companies to satisfy a wide array of requirements.

The majority of IT execs we surveyed said that 2022 has been just as unpredictable as 2020, and reported that scaling applications has been tricky due to fluctuating demand.

Companies are finding that individual teams at their organization are using multiple cloud providers. There are varying reasons, with some of the most common being improved IT infrastructure flexibility, improved disaster recovery and business continuity, and access to a broader range of apps and services.



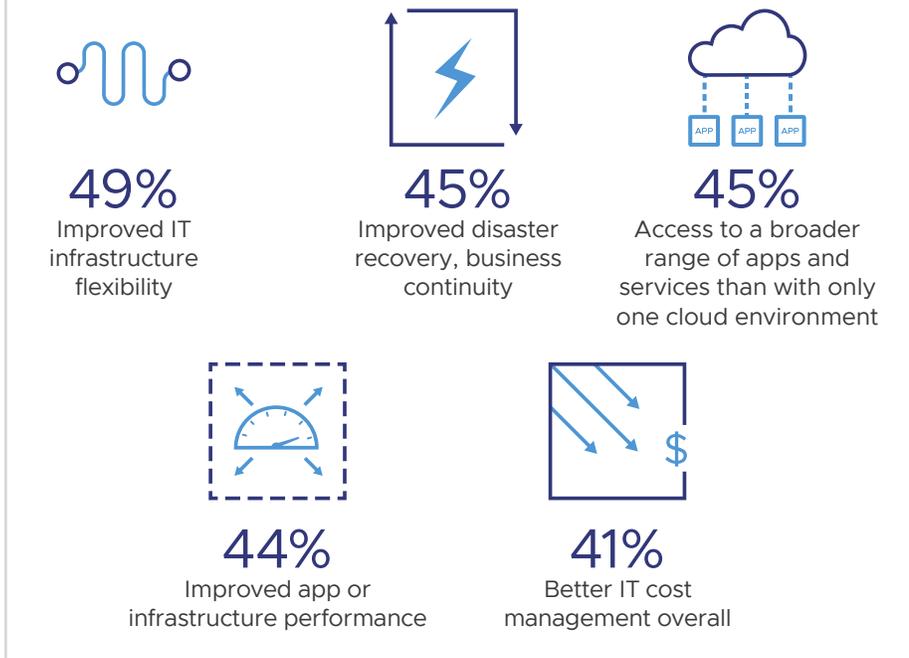

Respondents also told us that the cloud initiatives aren't exclusively being funded or managed from within IT. According to our survey, about one third of budgets backing strategic IT initiatives in 2022 are funded outside of IT.

U.S. Space Force portfolio team drives change

The U.S. Space Force is the space service branch of the U.S. Armed Forces and the world’s first and only independent space force. Historically, leadership was hesitant to use agile software delivery, thinking it was only for one-off apps and could not be successfully applied to complex war-fighting capabilities.

The Space Force applied VMware Tanzu products and services to modernize with new agile software solutions for the warfighters of both today and tomorrow. The force implemented 12 integrated applications by 2022, there are shorter feedback loops and cloud native greenfield apps have been developed in an agile manner. As a result, there is more advocacy from leadership based on the overall success of the portfolio team.

Demonstrating how crucial cloud strategy has become, 46 percent of respondents said that IT and lines of business were co-owning cloud strategy, showing a greater buy-in from organizations as a whole. Non-IT departments that are most likely to be influential when it comes to multi-cloud were operations, administration/management, and accounting/finance.

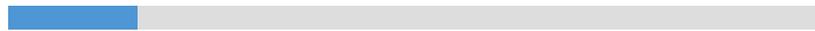
“Which statement best describes the level of control that team(s) have for your organization’s cloud strategy?”¹³

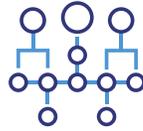




“Which departments outside of IT are most influential in developing your multi-cloud strategy? (top answers)”¹⁴



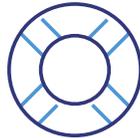

Part 3: Security is paramount as gaps between environments pose new risk

As companies continue to host their infrastructure among multiple clouds, and with specific teams using their own unique mix of public cloud services, respondents told us that security is a top priority. IT leaders are keen to make security a key component of their cloud strategy with 88 percent of respondents saying they are expanding disaster recovery and risk mitigation policies in 2022.

Almost two-thirds reported that they expect a data breach will target the weaknesses between their distributed application environments, and that fear is warranted, as more than half reported that their organization had already experienced at least one breach in 2022.

Visibility is a key factor in mitigating risks for respondents. When asked about their highest cloud security priority, 40 percent cited a need to have real-time visibility and compliance posture of all their apps. Piggybacking on that, 35 percent said they were prioritizing real-time alerts for security events, changes and risks regarding their entire app portfolio.

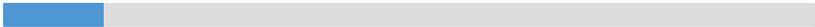
“Which of the following is the highest cloud security priority on your IT agenda in 2022 (if any)?”¹⁶



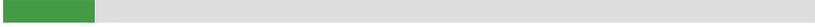

Part 4: Achieving improved control across clouds

One way respondents are improving visibility and control across clouds is by upskilling their talent, prioritizing infrastructure and operations (I&O) skills that improve their teams' expertise in visibility and controlling deployments across all platforms.

are prioritizing continuous integration (CI) / continuous deployment (CD) platforms to continuously build and deploy applications in rapid succession.



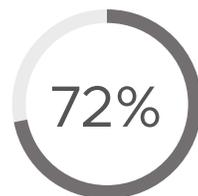
are prioritizing backup, recovery and high availability for resilience across clouds and protected data.

are prioritizing cloud cost management and optimization skills to identify and remediate wastage across clouds.

Organizations focused on upskilling talent who use VMware have reported improved KPIs from their multi-cloud ops initiatives. From improved efficiency and lower cost to security gains, organizations in this segment, those using VMware and upleveling talent for multi-cloud, recorded a number of benefits (average level of improvements shown below).¹⁸

Methodology and Endnotes

The **VMware FY23 H1 Benchmark** study was fielded on behalf of VMware by Management Insight Technologies between March 2022 and May 2022. The custom research was conducted in North America (U.S. and Canada), Western Europe (U.K., Germany and France) and APAC (Australia, New Zealand, Japan, India and China) using a combination of web and telephone interviews. Responses were collected from 1,700 IT leaders, IT decision-makers and developers who specialize in decision making for application workloads and infrastructure deployments. The sample targeted 10 percent small to mid-size businesses (2-999 employees), 30 percent commercial (1,000-4,999 employees), and 60 percent enterprise (5,000+ employees).

The **VMware Executive Pulse Q2** study was fielded between May 2022 and June 2022 on behalf of VMware by Qualtrics. Custom research was conducted in the Americas (Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Mexico, U.S.), Europe (Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, U.K., Spain, Sweden, Russia) and Asia Pacific (Australia, China, India, Japan, Singapore) using web-based surveys. Responses were collected from 456 C-Suite and senior technology decision-maker respondents involved in app and infrastructure platform decisions, with a balance of VMware and non-VMware customers. The sample targeted 49 percent commercial (1,000-4,999 employees), and 51 percent large enterprise (5,000+ employees).
